And the 30th year
Judith Noordrimans
discovered that day
at Aarberg.
She works as an orthopedic
surgeon at the RIAG
in the Netherlands,
Limburg City Hall.
And a RIAG is actually
the abbreviation
of a regional institution
for ambulances,
mental health care,
a Dutch institution
for mental health care,
for diagnostics
and treatment of people

with a psychiatric
or psychical approach.
We used the same website.
And it's actually
about people
for whom the ambulance care
was sufficient.
So actually
taking pictures
in a psychiatrist's hospital
is not necessary.
But their problems
are,
as well,
too complex
to just be helped
by a home doctor
or a social worker.
So Judith is there
at the hospital.
And she works with people
who are at the autism spectrum.
We're going to do it
from now on
as an ASS,
autism spectrum disorder.
And she works with
those people
who have that
and also with a family.
And that day,
July 22, 2003,
she goes first
at the 13-year-old Gilles
in the Riyach.
And Bea,
her mother,
is there too.
And Judith actually
talks to her
about their upcoming vacation
in France.
Because Judith
would go along

with Bea
and her family
so that she
would also be able
to take care
of Gilles.
Very noble.
Yes.
Now that afternoon
there was also
a team gathering
on Judith's agenda.
And while that place
is being found,
Judith actually
has a problem.
She's not doing well.
She took a bite
of her bread.
She starts to hyperventilate.
She's getting sick.
And that situation
escalates
very quickly.
So quickly
that Judith
loses consciousness.
She is taken
to the hospital
in an ambulance.
Judith also has a friend.
She is called
at the moment
that she is still
at her work.
She says
you have to get off
because it's not going well
with Judith.
And she carries
in that ambulance
to the hospital.
Yes.
Now

a heart scan
is being made
by her.
Judith
is still
not aware of this.
And while
the heart scan
gets her
a heart rate.
Doctors
try to
reanimate
her
to three times.
But
that doesn't work.
They no longer hit her.
And then
at 6.52
there is a
relief.
Now
the remarkable thing
is that
she still has
something to say
before they
arrive.
Namely
that
bread
doesn't
taste like
pindakas.

In 1977, the family moved back to the Netherlands, to Den Haag,
and finally they moved to Heerlen in Limburg, in the province of Limburg.
They moved to school, to the Brugklas, as it was written in the book.
It was very unfathomable for me, the Brugklas.

For me, it's something I know from watching television.
It's not a book, it's the Brugklassers.
I know it from Beugelbecky.
Oh, yes, yes, it's a Brugklass.
I can't say it, but I don't want to know.
I have no idea what the Brugklassers are.
There's a friend group,
with whom they've lived up to 30 years,
who will soon be.
Her friend is described as someone who cares for others,
who has that as a second nature.
Where did they spend their free time?
They went to Frank Bouye's concerts.
Do it, and the Dire Straits.
It seems fantastic to me.
At the end of middle school, it's very special.
They moved to Thailand, and they'll live in Bangkok
in the middle of the villages.
They have to be very educated.
A year after her friend starts her studies,
she goes to Utrecht, and she's going to study orthopedic pedagogy.
That's where she meets Jeroen, her first girlfriend.
She's a young girl who studies in A.A.,
but lives just across the border in the Netherlands,
so that's how we get to know each other.
While she's studying, she starts to work with vulnerable children.
She tells her about it.
She says, I act very seriously,
but I live for every millimeter of progress I make with my children's books.
She seems to be a very warm young woman who offers the other.
In 1997, she graduates.
She gets an immediate job at the RIAG in Cittard.
She's very attentive to friends and family during her free time.
With her, Boer Thomas takes various steps to the bioscope
and to the concerts of Ajax.
Everything seems to be going well in her life,
but suddenly her relationship with her great-loved Jeroen is over.
That's very difficult, because for Judith,
it was the man who took the rest of her life with her.
But on July 31, 1999, Judith learns new things.
After the round of heroes, I also googled them.
After the tour, there was a warrior competition
with a big party in the background.
Like you heard.

All the big athletes who have a mega sprint in Tour de France are there.
You can spot them.
After the round of heroes at the party,
Bart had to meet Judith, as you can see.
He's there with a girlfriend dancing.
He sees how spontaneous she is and how happy she is.
The dance moves will be gone in a minute.
And he talks to her and says,
I'll bring a present for you tomorrow morning.
He does that and it was confirmed.
It was confirmed, right?
Let's talk about Bart.
Bart was born on August 12, 1976 in Heerlen.
His father is a steamer, his mother is a housewife.
He also has a younger sister.
Now Bart is not as good as Judith is,
because he's been bullied a lot.
And I can't talk about that at home,
because there's no conversation about feelings in that family.
And there are obviously many rules that he has to follow.
He also leads that Bart is going to drink a lot later in life.
He started his studies, he studied technical science.
But he also keeps dreaming of a job at DSM.
That's a DeLimburg chemist.
And DSM says to himself,
we are renewers in food health and beauty.
And they develop, produce and combine
vital food, taste and smell
to make the growing world flourish.
And I've also read that they are a giant in enzymes and vitamins.
Many questions.
Many questions. It's not too fun yet.
What are you guys doing?
Something with vitamins and enzymes.
But good.
Good that they are there, actually.
Bart and Judith, from the beginning, can talk to each other very well.
I want to say something.
Something I have to laugh at.
About Bart, you said, his hobbies, his handball games and the internet.
I haven't heard that word since 2003.
The internet, yes.
I see myself writing in a friend's book.
What are your hobbies? The internet.

It's from 2008, the book.
Oh, okay, okay.
But it feels, indeed, very early 2000s.
So you guys still have kiddos? The internet.
My hobby is the internet.
So not the internet, the product, but the internet.
I've had it since then.
But it's still my hobby.
Let's go back. Bring back the internet.
Yes. Sorry, I interrupted you.
That's not very good.
Now, they can talk a lot from the beginning.
It's going pretty well.
Judith doesn't really talk about Gironne at all.
So she talks a lot about him.
But Bart, on his side, also has a former relationship
that he's still working on,
namely the one with his ex-fiend, Ellen.
She came to Ruzi to live in a car accident.
She's pretty strong.
So I think she's also talking about bondage.
Judith, when it comes to her work
and what she's all about,
she's talking about that tragic relationship with Ellen.
And after a year, they've decided to live together.
And Bart feels at home very quickly, with the Judith family.
He's seen as friendly, helpful, together.
But it's still closed.
He's never learned to communicate.
It will be intense, because in the start of your relationship,
all the two of you, with very big issues coming together,
it will be difficult to tell your open mind.
Yes, indeed, indeed.
Now, in the meantime, he's stopped drinking.
And here, indeed, I had...
He's on the internet a lot.
I thought it was going to be on the internet.
He's literally in a book.
Yes, indeed.
I thought, I'm not going to use the internet.
That happened. That's in 2008.
Now, it goes on.
They're buying a sphere-filled, 30-year-old apartment in January 2003.
So they're quite...

They're from 1999, together, if I'm not mistaken.
So going steady, if that's the case.
And they're buying that apartment just outside the centre of Heerlen.
And it's mostly Judith who's actually taking care of the interior.
A lot of flowers and plants are in the book.
But they just bought a house, that's just built in.
And Judith is starting to doubt about that relationship.
Yes, she's going to walk with her friend
and she talks about doubts for the first time.
And she says, look, I really want to get married
and I want to have children.
That's really the next step in my life.
But I'm not sure if Bart is ready for that.
I have the feeling that there's a bit of a back-to-back attitude
about the next step in our relationship.
And yes, that's never the case alone.
Because Bart, as you said, wants to work at DSM,
is trying to ask for it.
And it's basically cut off based on a psychological test.
It turns out that he's insecure and impulsive.
And that's really hard for him and it's cut off for Judith.
I can't really talk about that.
And on his current job, he's got a lot of stress.
And Judith feels like, OK, this isn't going well, Bart needs me.
So he decides to take a week off in July 2003
to spend time together with Bart.
And if he's going to eat at his parents' house during the week,
then he's going to lie down and say,
I'm doing fine, so my Bart is doing fine,
but my Bart himself is really not doing well at the moment.
No, he's cutting off more and more and more on the internet.
Now, right before her death, Bart calls Judith's parents
and says, look, your daughter is coming in.
It's going very badly with her.
So the parents are still going to the hospital.
But unfortunately, they have to see in the three of them
how Judith is actually going to survive.
Now Bart is talking to Judith's parents and he says,
look, last night,
they still had it, that we decided to get married and have children.
So according to Bart, everything went very well.
So everyone is really unexpected.
And Judith's parents also saw something like, fuck,
that's the second time he's lost his girlfriend

in a tragic way.
Now, it's like Judith decided,
look, I want to donate my organs.
So the doctors also ask,
the doctors ask the parents and Bart, look,
are we going to do that?
And they're giving you...
They're giving you permission.
So I don't know how that...
I think in Belgium, you're an automatic organ donor.
But I think in the Netherlands, you still have to click on
if you want to be an organ donor.
I think that's the difference, but I'm not 100% sure.
Now, as you can see, Judith has already given it.
She says, yes, do it.
And for that...
So actually, in the first instance, they're giving it all,
because it's mainly about giving them what they want to use.
Before they get rid of it, they're going to take off their blood.
And they're going to fill 10 holes.
What's actually logical, that's a young woman of 30
who's going to get rid of it,
you have to look at where that comes from,
a underlying cause.
So if it's not that strange, I think you'll have to research it.
Yes, indeed.
And she came through a hard state of life,
and indeed, they think it's weird.
So they actually want to research it,
and they also decide what blood to send to that toxicologist
next to the 10 holes they've already taken
for that research for organ donation.
Now, there's also an option, but they don't give it up.
And yes, okay, everything is put in place for the funeral.
They would be buried a week later.
A few of them would be buried together with the parents.
They're all put in place.
But then, suddenly, that toxicologist,
who got a bit of blood from Judith,
said, look, I found traces of caffeine and chocolate
in her blood, but also of unknown substances.
And we have a standard research here
where we can't trace it with us.
And that's in an article where the doctor comes up with the word.

I believe it's from the people's newspapers,
and in the morning, you also talked about the doctor
who had a lot of impact on her.
And that's also part of the word.
So the doctor tells that here,
and suddenly that toxicologist called to say something was wrong.
So she tells the doctor, look,
Judith's body was sent to the forensic institute in Rijswijk.
And there, they couldn't find anything suspicious.
And we also didn't have enough blood to be able to do the tests
until the doctor remembers that there's still a lot more blood,
because we've taken those 10 drops of blood off her.
So those words can still be studied.
And then they can actually determine the unknown substance,
it turned out to be cyanide.
So the conclusion is that they have to be forgiven.
Yes.
And there is a...
I want to make a little summary for Judith's colleague,
the employee of the month, or year, or forever,
because after Judith got involved in her work,
and with the ambulance,
a colleague took her bread and brought it with him.
And when it turns out that Judith would be guilty,
the employee of the month, year, forever,
comes up with that bread and says,
maybe we should also investigate this.
But what appears to be the sign for not finding cyanide?
No.
In the case with the ambulance,
and they do come up with a look,
we do know that the colleague says that it was made by Bart.
So then the alarm goes off.
Yes, and we know Bart is a chemist,
maybe we have to do something else after the investigation.
The day before the funeral of Judith, 31 July,
Bart was reminded of forgiveness.
Yes.
And they also have things to go on with that, of course.
Yes, because they actually went to his work.
And in his office they loaded two bottles of sodium azide
and teobromine.
And now I give people one second of the time.
If you say you're not a chemist, that should be cool,

because you now know what's going on, and we don't.
Yes. Okay, so for everyone who doesn't study,
wait, do I have to do this?
No, no, you have to do this, you have to do this.
But I had to do this, and I wasn't sure what that meant.
What does that mean?
But maybe people listen to our podcast.
And now they say, oh my God!
Okay, but now we have enough time.
And then you have an exam.
So, what do you do, two-stores?
If I explain it correctly, if I understand it correctly,
we're going to get a lot of DMs here.
Because Gemi is no longer a chemist.
So if those two substances, sodium azide and teobromine,
get in contact with the cancer,
does it appear to be cyanide?
Yes.
I didn't know.
I didn't know, I find it very dangerous.
Very much so.
So yes, the police finds that in his office,
the two substances that make cyanide.
Yes, but Bart says, yes, hello guys, I'm a chemist.
I work here in a chemist company.
Of course those substances are present here.
Why is it that they are in my office?
Even there I have a very good explanation.
I mean, there are a lot of schools on visit,
on a tour, and those are just two bottles
that are regularly lost out of the closet.
So I keep this in my drawer.
I wonder how many teenagers walk around with bottles of sodium azide
and teobromine, and how do they know that...
They get opium out of a chemist's closet, or what?
I don't know what's in a chemist's closet, but...
Or is this just a known chemist for me?
Yes, please don't tell all the best chemists
who listen to us that it's obvious information
that you get in your first class chemistry.
Yes, because then we're in a problem.
Then we're in a problem.
And that's going to make us...
That's going to make us take our diplomas off.

Hmm, I'm going to quit.

I'm not going to quit, I'm not going to quit, I'm not going to quit.

But yes, the police has said, okay, fair enough,

then maybe we're going to do a house-seeking at your house.

And the substances aren't being found there.

No, the house isn't on the board either.

No, no, no, the board isn't being found either.

So in that respect, Bart can still be wrong.

He keeps on arresting, he's being arrested, arrested, arrested, arrested.

But it's...

Yes, I'll say this 14 times more, because while he's being arrested,

on September 19th, Bart finally breaks up

and he's going to get to know about it.

Yes, he tells me.

I did put the sodium mazide and the theobromine

on the board of the pindaca.

So literally only on that first bite.

That's why you didn't find anything on the rest of the board.

I had mixed it with the two products a week ago

in my juice.

On the feet.

On the feet.

Not just the two substances in his juice,

but I suspect in a bottle or in a bag.

Because after that, I put the rest behind the washing machine.

You didn't find it while looking for the house.

Not a lot of the time.

And I looked for the house after the day

because I thought you'd come back, threw it away in the bars.

And after he got to know, he went to look for the agent

and effectively found the rest

where he left it behind.

But the risk he took, because he threw it so randomly in the bars...

Maybe it was his garden.

Yes, but then again, there must be someone to pass by.

I mean, it's super dangerous stuff.

Even if he doesn't know what can happen with it,

there must be someone to get in there anyway.

I think it's a risk.

And also, the man first made that pindaca

and then a pencil bowl for himself.

I would make the mistake of using the same knife.

Oh, I would also lick that knife.

An extra pindaca.

It's morning.
The coffee hasn't gone yet.
Yes, the coffee hasn't gone yet.
It would come across to me like this.
So I think he took a few risks, because he didn't...
Yes, and the thing is, of course,
there's a lot of motivation from Bart.
And this really makes me so pissed off.
His first statements say that he doesn't know anymore
why he killed you.
I mean, he's not going to do that in a flag of duty, right?
You've prepared this for a week.
I mean, you've looked up the substances,
or maybe it's a paratocan, I know a lot,
but you've taken it with you, you've smeared it with bread.
You've gone to the hospital, you didn't intervene,
you didn't tell the doctors, you said, oh, sorry, it was me.
I mean, I don't know why I killed you,
but he's finally coming to the scene and says,
I saw a lot of pressure to become a father.
And this was the easiest solution.
Really, where does it go?
Do normal.
The police, oh, sorry.
No, no, no.
He says, yes, he also says that I was a huge fan
of making our relationship.
And I said, you're really pissed off.
But do you still get why he has so much to say?
I think so too.
I'm really pissed off at her.
So I can finish the relationship,
I can take my own life.
No, what I'm going to do is I'm going to become a friend.
Now, the police will also find out
that Bart has been living a double life for years.
Through the internet.
He has made regular agreements,
sexual agreements with other couples.
Apparently, he was already on the internet
after the death of Judith,
and in search of couples to talk to me.
And Judith's family and friends really fell behind
when they heard all that.

And yes, what he's saying is that he doesn't want to be a father.
This was the easiest solution.
Now, of course, there will be two
and they say, look, we think that Bart also has ASS.
In the first place, they say it's Asperger's syndrome.
I've learned that Asperger's syndrome is an older term.
And that's why we're talking about ASS,
the autism spectrum disorder.
But people who know more about this...
If we make a mistake, let us know.
Now, one of the perpetrators was Bart's behavior,
especially sent by those drunken thoughts
that Judith had to disappear
because he couldn't communicate about it.
So about the fact that we have to marry him, we have to have children.
So for him, it was, according to that doctor,
let me put it clearly,
I can't say that people with ASS are violent,
or that every person with ASS can't communicate.
But that's what this behavior is capable of.
He can't communicate about what he actually wants in his relationship.
So for him, it was the easiest solution to kill Judith.
He said, yes, so the lack of communication
is going on and on and on and on.
And he also felt threatened in that relationship.
So he went on to the end of the story.
Now, in 2004, on January 28th,
he started his process in Maastricht.
And Bart also took the word for it.
And he said, I wasn't doing well for months,
it didn't go well for a while,
so Judith and I, I end up more and more.
And he dropped a bomb.
I literally wrote it down.
He was turned into an ex in an old case.
He never existed.
What was the reason for Bart to resent Ellen?
Judith started talking a lot about her ex-friend.
I asked a friend to stay away from her.
So there, there, the...
Yes.
I don't want to say I understand it, but...
You also want to make a certain impression.
Yes, or I can understand it.

Especially because it seems very beautiful in the beginning,
when we were talking about it,
of two people in a row who strengthen each other
in a positive way,
working together on what they're doing.
And maybe Bart was afraid.
He was like, I can't... I can't put that weight on the table.
So I have to resent something.
I have to resent something.
While I think he probably doesn't have the easiest time at home,
he was able to be open about so many things.
He was able to talk to me.
I think Judith was the perfect person for him.
He was someone who was very empathetic,
so involved with other people.
So he understood everything.
Do you have to resent a story to make yourself interesting?
Amazing. The parents in the hospital said,
oh, this is your second girlfriend you've lost.
I mean, I would shame myself so much.
I would shame myself so much.
But he also says,
it's true that Judith and I have experienced a lot of pain,
and that he would like to turn it back.
And he doesn't even understand
that he put the button on Sunday to do it.
I didn't hear him say it,
but I do think he's really ashamed.
I believe so, too.
I do believe so.
The Office of Justice, we know that here as the public prosecutor.
That doesn't mean that Ellen maybe did do it.
Yes, I think this is such a strange chronicle.
And it suggests that Bart has forgiven his previous girlfriend,
but there's no proof of it.
I don't think they really found anything in that investigation.
And it seems like you want to make a serial killer.
Yes, and you can also find out very quickly
whether Ellen has existed or not.
No, I don't think so.
But he still has a good contact with his family.
Yes, but you've never seen him.
I know that.
Anyway, I mean, this case is about the murder of Judith.

Let it be.
Yes, indeed.
Maybe we should bring this up another time.
Now, for the murder...
Not now, I'm talking about the murder.
I'm talking about you, too.
You tell us this as much as you want.
The Office of Justice says,
for the murder of Judith,
I'm in prison for 12 years plus TBS.
And the tank...
I've also looked for something,
because we often mislead it.
So I've looked for something.
You're doing well.
Oh my God, before I use such a bad website.
Okay, so TBS is the abbreviation of the murder case.
TBS is a case that has been sentenced to death
or personality or personality.
It's a case that is charged with a safe return
of perpetrators in society.
And the judge decides whether a perpetrator
gets a mental disorder,
a mental disorder,
or in danger of rape.
So it's like, okay, you have to be punished,
but you also need help.
That's why we're talking about TBS.
And the help is at the same time with the prison sentence?
No, it doesn't have to be.
And they also said to Bart,
I want you to do your prison sentence first,
and then TBS will do it.
So you have to prove what you did first
and then we'll help you.
I think that's a bit of a general reasoning.
But maybe I misunderstood that part.
I do know that there is effective court punishment.
Okay, because two weeks later,
it's said that not until 12 years old,
like you said,
but until six years of prison sentence plus TBS,
the court will still be in office,
and Bart will get the eight-year prison sentence with TBS.

That was in 2004.
So Bart is already running around again.
Yes, of course you don't know.
I can be a TBS, also a prison sentence.
That might be possible.
I regret a lot of that prison sentence.
And I know that in Belgium life is not long,
life is long and 30 years is not 30 years.
But six years is really special, can I say that?
Yes.
Yes, but I also think it's because it's a combination
with a story, indeed.
And that the man before the prison sentence is at TBS.
Absolutely.
Then at the prison sentence.
But I just regret the sentence.
That's what I'm talking about.
I have a little bit more to say about the doctor
who convinced you about this.
And she says, since then I'm more on my toes
than expected about suffering.
I take the scar faster in where the blood is often from.
Because you see, this was not solved without the extra blood,
so that they can still do some research later.
And she also says, a young woman who leaps away
under our hands, our forgiveness attempts
to get what was with her on the hand,
the sad panic of her parents.
That has made all of this deep impression on me and my colleagues.
And then that friend at her bed, so busy and drunk,
while he knew that he was looking for a poisonous boat
that had smelt for her.
In the last few hours before her death, he began to talk to her murderers
and that still filled me with despair.
He had nearly killed the perfect person,
but because she donated her organs, he was still unmasked.
I thought it was super beautiful and super solid,
but I find it very terrifying
that when you die on your 30th,
in a hospital with such intense hyperventilation,
a clear reaction to something
that was not found at all for the same reason.
That this could have just happened.
But the first toxicological research has indicated

that we can't identify at this moment.

And so it was lucky that they still had the other stale blood.

But I do think there is enough action to take back the past,

because they could have just said,

yes, heart stillness.

And without further research to do.

Because the family could have also said,

we don't want autopsy or we don't want further research,

or I mean, I think Bart was also shocked by that.

Oh, shit.

Those are all factors that the man didn't really consider.

Yes, he went for the perfect murder.

I mean, if you take two products so securely,

that no cyanide is on the tip of a pot,

then they...

I think so.

They just had to start on the other side of their bread

and I didn't eat it all up.

And he was still alive.

That was on one tip of the bread.

Yes, I think that's really breaking.

And that's maybe what's not just disturbing me,

but what's really bothering me in those six years.

For me, it's really a murder to think about.

That's planned, that's executed, that's...

Yes, that's what I thought.

It wasn't, oh, oops.

I didn't mean that.

Or, yes, I was angry and I mean, that's not natural either.

But that's a flag and an appeal.

Here it's thought over, here it's executed, here it's...

It's just pure murder.

Yes, indeed.

And that's why I think it's so disturbing.

In my opinion, they're very mild in those years of punishment.

Because I hope that Bart will get a good treatment

and will learn to communicate emotionally.

And yes, we know that this is not the solution.

Yes, the Pindaka's murder.

Yes, that's what it's called.

So thank you, but I don't know it yet.

I eat Pindaka every morning.

That's good, I like it.

Also with the Hagen slag or without it.

Oh, no, I'm doing my Havermount.

Oh, okay.

Yes, but I would eat Pindaka on everything.

Yes, delicious.

Do you also like ice cream?

No, that's speculoos, nevermind.

No, I get it.

I thought there was also Pindaka's.

Oh, no.

It does exist anyway.

It does exist anyway, you didn't find anything new here.

Do you smear the butter at me sometimes?

Very often.

But yes, you're also the cook at home.

I don't have to smear the butter at home.

No, I cook at home.

Me too.

Hey, Lukas.

But I don't have access to the chemicals for her work, so...

No, I wanted to see if she could get rid of that.

If you wanted to buy that or something.

I think it's a coincidence that we're bringing in a male killer.

Yes, indeed, yes, that's right.

In fact, there are women who do that.

But if we... I don't know Bart very well,

but I understand that he doesn't want to be a killer.

If I can understand his character a bit,

it doesn't seem like someone who wants to confront the killer.

I mean, he doesn't want to be a killer.

Sometimes you can forgive him at home,

but the fact that he does that, so that he doesn't have to see it...

But then, knowing that your girlfriend leaves you for work,

you go to work yourself as well.

And then, okay, now it's time to wait.

Yes, I find that difficult.

Just carry it out and then wait.

That's also a kind of cool blood, isn't it?

Yes, yes, yes.

That's why I don't say that with the exception of the right thing.

Or something like that.

Very interesting.

Very interesting thing.

Thank you all for suggesting it.

He really got mad at you.
