Welcome to episode 5 of Ambassadors, our show that takes you behind scenes of the Between Two Beers podcast.

Shay, how are we doing?

Very good. Yeah, we recorded an episode, I'm a little bit low energy.

Late night researching, and I think I got my show notes through to you at 3.34am, so maybe running on for a few years.

Yeah.

No, I think the authenticity part is the key there.

And I was surprised.

I was like, ah, she's going to be in corporate mode.

And it was just so cool.

Man, her story, her storytelling, the emotional, the vulnerability, the whole thing.

Brilliant.

Yeah.

She came out of the, she came out of the blocks hot too.

Came straight after me.

You and your new relationship.

Yeah.

Yeah.

But that's fine.

Yeah.

I guess she's allowed to.

She's the most powerful woman in sports administration.

She is.

Good friend to have.

Do and say what she wants.

We also on Monday released Russell Packer.

Rusty P.

Yeah.

What do you think?

Yeah.

It was a long time in the works to get Russell Packer out.

His first real time on a podcast, sharing his story.

We teased it in the Josh Coleman episode.

I think they both read a man's search for meaning and we had a lot of feedback from people saying, oh, where's the, where's the Russell Packer at?

Where's the, did you take it down?

Where is it?

You know, timing it with a, with the warriors and up the wires kind of movement as well was, was, I think will be a master stroke.

We had a few that had to jump in line, but it's out there.

The thing that I like about this whole thing really is you change perceptions.

My perception got changed of who Russell Packer was.

I knew him as a headline.

I knew him as the guy who was in jail, the guy that was sort of pissed his pants at the warriors, but talking to him, man, there is a guy on a quest for knowledge, the first to learn and get better and make self improvement and talking to him like, yeah, it just totally changed.

And it makes me think of all the other people I've got these sort of views or opinions on probably so far away from, from who they really are.

Cause I really enjoyed his company, like a really nice, thoughtful guy.

We've been messaging him since.

Yeah.

And to drive three hours up all the way from Papamoa on his partner's birthday to come and spend some time with us and share a story was, it's, I guess it speaks to what he wanted to do.

And I'm really happy that we got, we've got a platform and gave him a platform for him to start retelling that story.

And hopefully it's helpful to some people out there that have listened to it.

Yeah.

Very strong lessons in there.

Recapping last week, we went on a triple date.

Didn't we?

Yes.

Me and.

Is that a thruple?

Is that what they call it?

Me and my wife, Bon and Michael Main who we just mentioned in his beautiful wife, Tyler, and you and your new partner.

Doc Brown.

Your partner.

You can say Doc Brown.

Yeah.

It was nice.

Megan Wilkinson was there as well.

Yeah.

Yeah.

Fan of the show.

Yes.

It's quite nice.

I mean, there's six months in, but it's just, it's like PDA, you know, holding hands.

We went for a drink.

Holding hands PDA?

We went for a drink and then we went to somewhere to eat and then we walked to watch Tom Sainsbury

show and it's holding hands the whole way.

And me and Bon just in the back sort of just enjoying it.

They didn't encourage you to hold hands?

And then we held hands.

We're like, fuck these guys.

We can do that.

Yeah.

Right.

But it's nice, man.

It's nice.

Thank you.

Is that what you're saying the way that it was nice?

Is that the?

No, I really like it.

I think I've done guite well.

Yeah.

But that, it was cool to do that.

And we didn't sort of Tom Sainsbury's hour at the meteor.

Fuck that guy's funny, eh?

Yeah, it was good.

Like, I guess whenever a former guest comes into town as ambassad is it's only right that we welcome them in.

I think he was genuinely surprised that we went to the show.

I really enjoyed the show, particularly his comments on Raro, brought back a lot of memories of that Tupperware taste.

Always makes me laugh, his like demographics.

It's like older, like wine drinking mums.

And there's quite a few oldies there.

It's like, yeah, because that nostalgic shit hits hard.

Yeah.

Especially as you get older.

But if you get a chance to go and see it, great show.

I think he's touring the country.

Some between two beers, social media insights.

So you have gone viral across the last month for your Fijian accent.

We cut up a little clip.

I think, was it the last ambassad is the episode?

I think it was the one before, maybe.

Anyway, I'm going to read out some stats.

128,000 views.

It's been liked 19,000 times.

There's 548 comments and it's been shared 2,000 times.

Essentially has been picked up by the whole of Fiji.

And if you go and look at, if you go find that on TikTok and look at the comments,

it's universally, oh my God, I didn't know we had an accent until I heard yours.

It's so good, bro.

You're invited to the cook it.

Lovo.

Yeah.

Yeah.

Yeah.

Yeah.

Big Vinaka Vaka level to all of the fans in Fiji.

Thank you very much for your support and your goodwill.

God willing, I'll be coming back home to VT level anytime soon.

And love to see as many of my fans as possible.

He's done it again.

We've got another one.

We're going viral again.

I think I lost it a little bit there at the end.

I was a bit flustered.

No, it's good, man.

It's good.

Speaking of socials, Jimmy Nisham actually, black cap came out recently.

And I thought this slipped under the radar, which was your description of the famous part of the Forest Gump movie where the gentleman is running saying, I believe that belongs to Mr. Gilmore, which is very clearly from Happy Gilmore.

Yeah.

You can't say the name of the movie in the quote and then get the name right.

It's like, it was like a Steve, Carl Pilkington, Steve Merchant gag.

It was like, Carl Pilkington was like, what's the little things in the movie Gremlins? Gremlins.

Yeah, some of the areas.

But no, cheers, Jimmy.

Good to know you're tuning in.

Right.

A few questions from the fun bag.

Angus Rowland has written in.

I don't really get this.

Champagne or bone in?

What does that mean?

It's gone for the ham reference.

It's a champagne ham for me.

The other favorites are Honey Roasted, I think, is a manuka.

Do you know what I thought that meant?

No, but I'm retreat.

I thought it meant, would you prefer to go out on the champagne to have a night out or stay in and do some bone in?

No, you did.

I did.

That was what I thought we were answering.

Really?

Yeah.

Oh, wow.

No, it's a Hewed Meets reference.

Obviously, I've got a bit of grasp of the delicatessen section than you do.

Yeah, very cultured.

Rick from Hallensville, if you could do a live show with one former guest, who would it be?

Yeah, I've thought about this.

Mark Ellis, I think it's an easy choice.

And I think...

What does a live show look like?

I think there's a few ways you do it.

And we've been talking about doing a live show.

And I think with someone like Mark Ellis, you could just do one night with Mark Ellis.

And it's me and you on stage, and it's an hour to 90 minutes.

And it's just us prodding away to get him to tell the most epic stories of his life and career.

I think there's very few people in New Zealand that you could do that with in that form.

Someone who's lived an incredible life, is so high profile, is such a good storyteller,

is so engaging with the audience.

But Hewed, and it would sell like hotcakes.

Mark, if you're listening, let's do it.

Jeremy Wells from my side, if that's your description of what that headline act would be,

I think Jeremy Wells would be one.

The other way to do it is Graham Norton style.

I'm a big fan.

With three sort of lesser profile, perhaps, guests.

And they come out for 20 minutes.

You chat with one, you bring the next day out to chat, and then you bring them all together.

I think you could do it like that.

And so they're waiting in the wings in the background.

But one night with Mark Ellis, that sells out.

Yeah, nice.

That sells out.

Right, question from Steve.

I'm thinking of starting my own podcast.

What advice can you give me?

Are you breaking up with me?

Is that what's happening?

No, man.

Different Steve?

No, you're a good different Steve.

Different Steve.

Sounds like you're breaking up with me.

I would say...

And you're answering your own question?

Yeah, I'm going to answer my own question.

If you're starting your own podcast, do it for the right reasons.

Do it because it's something you enjoy doing.

It's unlikely you'll make money from it.

It's unlikely you'll attract an audience unless you stick with it for a long time.

I mean, that's just based on our journey.

It's been four years, but for the first...

First two years, the audience was tiny.

You keep going because it's something you enjoy doing.

Have a point of difference.

Have something which separates you from the rest.

Ours was long form.

No one else was really doing 90-minute plus episodes.

We thought we could do them well.

It separates us.

But yeah, just go into it with the right reasons.

Don't expect to make money from it because there's a shitload of podcasts out there and not many of them are making money.

There's more and more coming out every day.

You talk about our audience being very small from the beginning.

If you're still on with us, keep an eye out for the coming months.

We may be dipping our toe back into the football space

with a guest coming up that some people might enjoy hearing from.

Nice tease, bro.

Any questions you regret not asking a guest?

That's from Rory Taylor.

We went all the way to Gisborne to talk to Lance Keynes

and didn't talk about Excalibur,

the bat that everybody had through the 80s and 90s,

and Keynes Fudge also, we didn't talk about.

We were being on the plane on the ride home and we were like,

fuck man, there was such a cool lit article experience.

Fuck! Excalibur!

We've done that a few times.

I can't think on my feet of any very specific examples outside of that,

but we do sometimes come to the end of an episode,

finish recording, chatting with a guest afterwards

and being like, ah!

Forgot to ask about Insert Big Part of Their Life

that we didn't deem interesting enough

during the two hours that we've spoken to them.

Yeah.

Right, last one.

Looking ahead to this weekend,

Melville United in the Chatham Cup Final.

I think Mark Curry wanted to hear about this from down south.

He's a big fan of football and, I guess, to Melville United.

To put this into context.

Episode one, Aaron Scott.

Yeah.

Melville United captain at the time.

They had just lost Chatham Cup Final.

Yeah, 2019, four years ago.

And he's still going.

He's talking about maybe quitter, you know, maybe...

Your dad, Bruce Holloway, retired him at the end of that Chatham Cup Final.

Four years later, here he is about the...

And he's still got absolute grass-roots legend of the game.

Four kids still going, and he's in Chatham Cup Final again.

North Harbour Stadium, we're going to be there.

Support in Melville.

You know, long down.

Has he had a vasectomy?

I don't know.

I don't know if it's my place to say.

We can only speculate.

You played in a Chatham Cup Final.

I'm going to indulge you with a little bit of football chat

with us, anyone.

You played in 2003 in a Chatham Cup Final.

Was that the highlight of your playing career?

No, I did some things in America, but I was 17.

Yeah, Chatham Cup Final up 1-0, lost 3-1.

Yeah, I think reflecting on this coming Chatham Cup Final,

it just made me think of the podcast journey

because Aaron was the first quest.

And if you go back and listen to it, it's fucking raw and rough,

we had so much fun talking, essentially doing the same thing we're doing now,

except that was just a guy who lived down the street who he'd played football with.

So here, four years later, to be thinking about that journey

and linking it in with the Chatham Cup Final and sort of history repeating.

I don't know, something cool about that.

So maybe we go back after the Chatham Cup Final and we record Aaron Scott again

and we just do everybody from episode 1 through episode 140 again and see if we end up in four years' time exactly where we are right now.

Hey, it's a direction. It's an idea.

It's an idea.

It's certainly an idea.

No, but go and watch Chatham Cup Final.

Go support Melville. Be on TV.

Yes, it will be.

You could go along.

It will be on TV.

Anyway, thanks for tuning in.

Make sure you flick us your questions at any time, really.
